A When it went northbound Chad Cooper had set up some stop sticks in front of the vehicle.

Q Tell us about when it started northbound on Turtle Mound, what happened, what speed you were going.

A We proceeded northbound on Carolwood up to about fifty miles an hour I would say, the vehicle was obviously attempting to elude myself to escape capture. He continued northbound in the area of Lake Washington here. Once it reached Lake Washington it again ran over

several sets of stop sticks that had been placed out by other officers.

- Q Did it stop at that time?

A At that point it started to quickly evolve that we started hearing Brevard County sheriff deputies might have been involved and one of them might have been injured. So, we all, including myself, began responding to the area.

- Q And where did you go?
- A I made my way up to Turtle Mound and other officers were setting up a perimeter. The suspect vehicle was somewhere in the neighborhood to the west of Turtle Mound between Aurora and Lake Washington and I had found an open spot at Palomino Road I believe it is right at Turtle Mound and it appeared to be an empty spot for me to set up as a perimeter point.
- Q Were there other officers visible to you also setting up perimeters?
- A Yes, they were in that area, some a little bit north of me, some were to the west.
 - Q So, at the point that you sat up at Palomino

- Q You indicated you were at lunch when the call came out or on a lunch break, what area in the city were you in at the time?
- A At that time I was right off of Bulldog and Babcock in that neighborhood.
 - Q Over behind Mel High?
- A Yeah, in that area.
- Q And what route did you take from that area over to Palomino and Turtle Mound?
 - A To be honest, I don't know, I do know I had in-car video going the whole way but I don't know.
 - Q What happened once you got set up there at Palomino and Turtle Mound?
 - A After getting set up there, they quickly located the suspect victim and initiated a pursuit of that vehicle.
 - Q Were you listening as to where the vehicle had been spotted and where it was going?
 - A Yes, they started advising us that it was

coming towards Turtle Mound which was my area.

Q What, if anything, did you do based on that information?

A At that point I retrieved my stop sticks from the trunk of my vehicle and deployed them on the opposite side of the road which is the west side of the road and stopped southbound traffic hoping and waiting for them to come on to Turtle Mound.

Q This may be fairly basic, but let's explain to the jury what stop sticks are and how they work.

There's many different devices but essentially this device is a stretch of approximately six feet of a triangular tube that has -- inside of there are deflating devices, you know, spikes essentially that would puncture the tire and start to deflate it. So, those are deployed. The ones that we have, they're on a long string so we would deploy it, and the ideal situation is on the opposite side of the road out of the roadway and we would extend our string all the way across to the other side and we can just wait and pull it across the street as the suspect vehicle's coming?

Q What, if anything, happened after you heard the information that the vehicle was heading toward Turtle Mound?

A The vehicle came upon my sight about a hundred

yards to my south and it turned northbound towards me, it 1 was being pursued by one other vehicle which was Sergeant 2 Shaffer. So, at that point we had -- I had southbound 3 vehicles stopped and the suspect vehicle, white I believe 4 it was a Ford SUV, they had swerved and passed going into 5 oncoming traffic, had passed the vehicle going northbound 6 7 and as they passed that they're now approaching me 8 probably about forty, fifty miles per hour. And so as they get closer I'm waiting towards essentially the last 10 minute that I can pull these spikes across the road and that way they don't really see it coming. So, I did so, I 11 pulled it across and was able to effectively use them. 12

Q Were you able to determine whether or not any of the tires ended up getting struck and if they deflated -- do they deflate immediately or does that take a period of time?

A Usually it's over a time, that way it's not a big explosion and a crash, but yes, at least one tire, they did -- the vehicle did run over the strip and at least one tire I could tell was affected.

Q Were you able to see Sergeant Trevor Shaffer's vehicle at that point?

A Yes, he was immediately behind it and actively pursuing it.

Q I take it that you moved the stop sticks enough

that Sergeant Shaffer wouldn't hit them?

A Yeah, he did not hit them, he was able to -usually when we set those up they know ahead of time that

on without striking them and then I followed in behind.

Q Did it slow its speed or anything through the intersection?

A I don't recall it slowing, if it braked at all it was -- again, other stop sticks were being deployed so they may have hit their brakes trying to find a way out, but they definitely continued through the stop sign, yes.

Q What happened after it passed Lake Washington?

A It again hit a set of stop sticks and you could tell that that again was successful and at that point either, either the one tire -- the tires began to definitely lose control, I believe one even came off, and

the vehicle started to lose control.

Q When you say the tire came off, it came off the rim?

A I believe at that point it was definitely deflated to almost on the rim, I don't recall exactly whether it completely came off, but more tires were deflated and they were losing control.

Q What happened as you proceeded northbound on Turtle Mound?

1.4

A We continued to proceed northbound maybe approximately thirty or forty-five miles per hour, the vehicle's swerving pretty much staying in the middle of the road and as we approached Parkway and Wickham, which is the next major intersection, it's not a four way stop, it's kind of offset, but the vehicle attempted to make a right hand turn onto Parkway to go eastbound. At that point it couldn't successfully make the turn and it went into the northeast corner of the intersection hitting the stop sign and hitting a guardrail there.

Q Did the vehicle come to a stop?

A At that point, yes, it crashed into the stop sign and guardrail, came to a brief stop when myself and Sergeant Shaffer got out of our vehicles to address the vehicle and the occupants.

Q And how did you try to address the vehicle and

occupants at that point?

A At that point when we got out it was just enough point to get out of our vehicle when we saw the vehicle starting to back up so we then got back into our vehicle. The vehicle began to back out and continue its right hand turn onto Parkway at which point it just kept going into the southeast direction across Parkway and rolling into a ditch.

Q What happened at that point?

A When it rolled into the ditch it fell on to its passengers side. The ditch is down pretty -- maybe ten feet or so. So, the whole vehicle is now inside below ground level pretty much and then we began just to set up a perimeter around the vehicle.

Q And were efforts being made now to order the occupants out of the vehicle?

A Yes.

Q How did you all do that?

A Through verbal commands we were setting up a perimeter around the vehicle as best we could given a very unique situation, but as we did that we then began giving verbal commands, we were trying to get those individuals to, you know, raise their hands and get out of the vehicle.

Q Did the occupants exit the vehicle immediately?

1 A Not immediately, no.

Q How long did it take before you were able to get them out?

A It was an extended period of time, I don't recall, it could have been twenty minutes until they were finally taken out.

Q And did you maintain your position on the north side of the ditch the entire time or did you go to the south side?

A I was on the north side the entire time.

Q And you referenced a couple of times earlier in your testimony that your in-car video system was operating, is that correct?

A Correct.

Q Did you activate it manually or is this one that automatically came on when you started using your lights?

A Automatically came on. So, it actually started when I began responding from the south end of the city.

Q And at my -- did you provide a copy of your in-car video images to the State?

A Yes.

Q And at my request did you look at a DVD containing the in-car video from that morning?

A Yes.

MR. MCMASTER: May I approach the witness, 1 2 Judge? THE COURT: Yes, you may. 3 BY MR. MCMASTER: 5 Showing you what has been marked for identification as Exhibit I believe it's BL. 6 7 THE COURT: It is BL. Okay. 8 BY MR. I'm not sure if I take Nasa and head out to Wickham or if I go Apollo to Sarno.

At this point we hear the initial -- the call of the officer hearing shots but it's not later until it starts to evolve. Because normally if an officer just here's shots they have enough individuals to handle it themselves so I wouldn't normally go from the south end, but as it begins to evolve and we hear that deputies are involved and somebody is injured you'll see me escalate my response to lights and sirens where I'm going through intersections and what not.

Q Now, when you were -- you said the system went on automatically?

A Yes.

Q In-car? When you activated your lights?

A Yeah, it would have come on automatically. At this point --

Q Does your system back up and capture some period of time before you turn the lights on?

A Yes. Yeah. So, generally it's set for two minutes or five minutes that it can actually begin recording even before the lights are on. We also have the ability to just go back and capture that video even if the lights weren't on.

Q You can just faintly hear the siren in the

background where you're chirping going through the
intersections?

A Yeah.

Q So, you actually received a phone call about thirty seconds or -- not phone call, dispatch about thirty seconds into the video.

A Yeah, I would have heard it before, I don't know exactly when but at this point we're now escalating our response to get to that area. So, this is Apollo Boulevard so I would make a left here and go northbound once everybody moves.

Q I take it not everybody moves out of the way for sirens?

A No.

Q Another unit was coming up from the left?

A Yeah, may have been. So, this is Apollo Boulevard northbound, the airport's on the left.

Q Melbourne Police Department off on the left hand side?

A Correct, and we'll be approaching Sarno Road here and we'll make a left to go westbound on Sarno. This should be Croton Road right there, continuing west towards Wickham.

Q Now, it's not captured on your in-car video but
I take it as you're proceeding towards that area you're

monitoring the radio traffic from the other units looking for the vehicle?

A Yes.

Q And are the sergeants on scene directing the units where to go as to set up perimeters or is everybody pretty much on their own picking where you were going to go?

A No, they'll begin -- and I believe Star is either on its way or already there as far as the helicopter for Brevard County Sheriff's Office so. But no, they'll have somebody in charge of attempting to set up some type of perimeter for the area.

I was coming from the south end and I was, I was getting in much later in the game and as I get there I pretty much just find a spot that looks open is how I made myself at Palomino and Turtle Mound.

- O You were northbound on?
- A This is should be Wickham Road.
- O Wickham?

A And this should be Eau Gallie Boulevard here.

I believe I go up to the next intersection is Aurora Road and I will go left and head westbound to Turtle Mound.

The suspect vehicle had been spotted by I believe Officer Middendorf in that area between Aurora and Lake Washington west of Turtle Mound.

1 Q You had been notified of that as you're heading 2 toward the area still?

A Yes. This is a Aurora Road and I'm heading — going to make a left and head westbound. And this should be Turtle Mound coming up here and I'll make a right hand turn to go northbound on Turtle Mound. There's one officer there set up and the next major intersection is Lake Washington so I'm going to stop just in the middle off to the right here which is Palomino Drive or Road, an entrance to a neighborhood?

- Q Is that Carolwood you just passed?
- 12 A I believe it was, yes.

Q There's a Melbourne unit parked there.

A At some point they locate the vehicle and the vehicle begins to flee from them and you'll see me get out of the vehicle. I don't know if you'll see me right away because I'm going to my trunk, I'm going to deploy the stop sticks.

It's a very unique situation with where we're at and them being in the ditch and what not so. But yes, I believe at some point, it's not myself, but somebody gets on the PA system in order to instruct them to get out of the vehicle.

- Q Detective Cooper, you have watched the entire in-car video?
 - A Yes.
 - Q It's a little over an hour long?
- A Yes.

Q Are you ever actually able to see the occupants come out of the vehicle on the video?

A Not really, no, given the shadows and the video you don't even really see but what happens which the team of officers go on to the opposite side of the ditch and they're removed from the vehicle, from there you don't you don't really see it at all.

Q And approximately thirty-one minutes into the incident is when flash bang you can actually hear and see on the video goes off and that's when the occupants have already been removed and the vehicle was cleared to make sure there was no one else in there?

A Correct.

Q So, this is basically the view we're going to have from now until at least a half hour into it?

A Yes.

MCMASTER: I don't have all of my stuff here, Judge, I have another five boxes back in my 21 office. We might have to do the same thing. 22 MR. MOORE: Right. So, we -- you know, we 23 object unless it can be shown that this witness was 24 disclosed and if they have disclosed it that resolves 25

it, but if they haven't then, you know, we would object, but none of us have it.

MR. MCMASTER: Judge, I think the witness we initially disclosed with respect to the helicopter was Frances Coppola or John Coppola and I think a fellow named Samms was my understanding is who the co-pilot who was operating the equipment. When we went to go over the testimony with them we discovered that Samms was not the individual, it was this witness, Michael Ryle. I believe my secretary supplemented the discovery with his name at that time and he's been on all the stuff including the witness list that was read to the jury panel when we started selecting the jury.

MR. MOORE: One name among two hundred plus names, that's not notice, that's all the State has done.

MR. MCMASTER: His testimony is purely to authenticate the helicopter video that was taken that day.

THE COURT: Do you want me to conduct a Richardson hearing?

MR. MOORE: Well, why don't we do that. I mean, assuming they may have but none of us have it and disclosed it, none of us have that supplemental

witness list. So, yes, we would like you to do that. The other expert or mechanic, I suppose, would be Detective Guillette and we deposed him, we wanted to know what his credentials were, what he did.

MR. MCMASTER: This witness is not an expert.

MR. MOORE: I don't know what he is.

THE COURT: They're just saying they need him to authenticate the helicopter DVD.

MR. MOORE: Well, that's sort of what Detective Guillette did. I mean, he didn't do anything that fell within the expert category, he took pictures and enhanced them which no, you know, it doesn't require expertise, but still we knew that he had hands on with pictures and, you know, we have -- since we apparently did not get notice of this gentleman, we didn't know what he did and if he's had any contact with any mechanism or reviewed pictures and is going to authenticate them.

I don't know what he's going to do. You know, maybe if Mr. McMaster says exactly what this gentlemen is going to do, then we know where we stand.

one who actually was the co-pilot in the helicopter on March 6th of 2012 operating the filming equipment. He has reviewed this disc, has initialed it and dated it as of, I forget what date he initialed it, but being the accurate video taken that day of the chase. It's about seventeen minutes of the chase and then they did about two or three minutes of video at the Elena crime scene from an aviation aerial viewpoint and then a couple minutes of the crime scene at Janewood area trying to get the tire tracks.

Do you have to place them in some sort of tank 11 0 or box or something to digest the fumes, insert the fumes 12 13 into it? Yes, we have a large super glue chamber. 14 Α Okay.
