JUROR NUMBER FOUR: No.

MR. LANNING: How long was she with the sheriff's department?

JUROR NUMBER FOURTEEN: Twenty-five years, something like that.

MR. LANNING: When it comes to the consideration of law enforcement testimony, are you going to give any leg up to law enforcement? Are they going to be on an even level?

JUROR NUMBER FOURTEEN: I'm follow the law the way it is, you give it to me the way I see it.

MR. LANNING: Well, what I'm concerned about is the way you see it may be that law enforcement has a step up.

JUROR NUMBER FOURTEEN: No, if the testimony given to me in the right manner, I have no preference (unintelligible).

MR. LANNING: Okay. In considering -- well, the fact that this was a female law enforcement officer, grandmother, mother, I believe in her early fifties, is that something that you can set aside your own experiences? Can you look at this case without picturing your wife?

JUROR NUMBER FOURTEEN: Yes. Oh, yes.

MR. LANNING: Do you have any adult children?

24	JUROR NUMBER 16: Yeah.
25	MR. LANNING: Were you do you have prior

military service? 1 JUROR NUMBER 16: Yes, I was in the Navy for 3 five years. MR. LANNING: Front row prior military service? 4 How long were you in the military. 5 UNIDENTIFIED JUROR: Four years, Marine Core. 6 MR. LANNING: Sir. 7 UNIDENTIFIED JUROR: Four years in the Coast 8 Guard. 9 MR. LANNING: Sir. 10 UNIDENTIFIED JUROR: Fourteen Air Force. 11 MR. LANNING: What brought you to Florida? 8 JUROR NUMBER 196: Warmer weather. 9 MR. LANNING: And you have adult children? 10 JUROR NUMBER 196: No, I do not. 11 12 MR. LANNING: Your political affiliation? JUROR NUMBER 196: Pardon me? 13 MR. LANNING: Political affiliation. 14 JUROR NUMBER 196: Republican. 15 MR. LANNING: Member of any clubs or 16 17 organizations? JUROR NUMBER 196: No. 18 MR. 15	MR. LANNING: Where are you from?
16	JUROR NUMBER 177: Originally from Illinois.
17	MR. MOORE: Okay.
18	JUROR NUMBER 177: Not Chicago, small, small
19	town.
20	MR. LANNING: What other types of employment
21	have you done? Have you ever done any other type of
22	employment than the
23	JUROR NUMBER 177: I'm currently HR manager,
24	I've always worked in a corporate field before coming
25	to Florida, mainly executive assistant

1 (unintelligible). MR. LANNING: What did your husband do for a 2 3 living? JUROR NUMBER 177: He was a retired military officer twenty-seven years. 5 MR. LANNING: Did you move around a lot? 6 JUROR NUMBER 177: I was not married to him 7 when he was in the military. He did move a lot. He 8 was in the Coast Guard so all up and down the east 10 coast. MR. LANNING: Adult children? 11 JUROR NUMBER 177: I have a daughter. 12 MR. LANNING: And what does she do for a 13 living? 14 JUROR NUMBER 177: She's in technology, she 15 works for major insurance companies. 16 MR. LANNING: Political affiliation? 17 JUROR NUMBER 177: I'm a registered Republican. 18 MR. LANNING: And clubs or organizations? 19 JUROR NUMBER 177: I'm a Coast Guard wife where 20 they live, where I live now and (unintelligible). 21 MR. LANNING: Member of a church? 22 juror numbe 177: Yes. 23 MR. LANNING: What church? 24 JUROR NUMBER 177: Non-denomination 25

1 (unintelligible). MR. MOORE: Thank you. Juror 159, where are 2 you from? 3 JUROR NUMBER 159: Originally from northwest 4 Indiana but Chicago. 5 MR. LANNING: And what brought you to Florida? 6 JUROR NUMBER 159: My mother lives here and 7 they own their own company so I started working here 8 about ten years ago in '04. 9 MR. LANNING: What type of work have you done? 10 JUROR NUMBER 159: Communications work, I 11 installed phone systems at \_\_\_\_\_for six years and I 12 clean houses now and yard work and stuff like that. 13 MR. LANNING: Political affiliation? 14 JUROR NUMBER 159: No. 15 MR. LANNING: Any clubs or? 16 JUROR NUMBER 159: No. 17 MR. LANNING: How about church? 18 JUROR NUMBER 159: No. 19 MR. LANNING: Jury 156. 20 (Thereupon, the proceedings were previously 21 transcribed.) 22 MR. LANNING: Juror 131, what's your 23 educational background? 24 JUROR NUMBER 131: BS in business 25

1 administration, MBA in (unintelligible). MR. LANNING: Where are you from? 2 JUROR NUMBER 131: Originally New Jersey. 3 MR. MOORE: How long have -- you've been in 4 Florida seven years? 5 JUROR NUMBER 131: December of 2006. 6 MR. LANNING: Why did you come down to Florida? 7 JUROR NUMBER 131: Job related. 8 MR. LANNING: Sir? 9 JUROR NUMBER 131: Job related. 10 MR. LANNING: Did your wife work outside the 11 12 home? JUROR NUMBER 131: No. 13 MR. LANNING: Has she ever? 14 JUROR NUMBER 131: Yes, she has. 15 MR. LANNING: What type of work? 16 JUROR NUMBER 131: She worked in the treasury 17 department in a major corporation in New Jersey. 18 19 MR. LANNING: Your political affiliation? 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other daughter is -- she's SSI, has a blood disease,

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and my other son who just got out of the Marines

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after ten years and been out about two years now and

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he works in security at the State department, and my

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other son who I mentioned before wrote a bad check and now having a hard time getting a job so he's home

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with me. So, he helps me and my wife. 1 MR. LANNING: And your political affiliation? 2 JUROR NUMBER 126: I'm a registered 3 4 independent. MR. LANNING: Adult -- you got two kids in 16 medical school? 17 JUROR NUMBER 122: Yes, sir. 18 MR. LANNING: Are they here --19 JUROR NUMBER 122: But I have three children. 20 MR. LANNING: Okay. Are they all adults? 21 JUROR NUMBER 122: Yes, sir. 22 MR. LANNING: And what's the third do? 23 JUROR NUMBER 122: He works in a retail store. 24 MR. MOORE: The two in medical school, is that 25

1 here in Florida? JUROR NUMBER 122: Yes, my daughter is in 2 Virginia my son is here in Florida, but his medical 3 school is actually in the Caribbean. 4 MR. LANNING: Married? 5 JUROR NUMBER 122: My children or me? 6 MR. LANNING: You. 7 JUROR NUMBER 122: Yes, I am. 8 MR. LANNING: And what's -- your spouse does 9 what type of work? 10 JUROR NUMBER 122: He does custom homes, he 11 12 does remodeling work. MR. LANNING: You indicated that you were a 13 court reporter but that you never did any criminal? 14 JUROR NUMBER 122: I'm sorry. 15 MR. LANNING: You indicated that you were a 16 court reporter but you never --17 JUROR NUMBER 122: No, I wasn't a court 18 reporter, I was a legal secretary for many years, 19 20 yes. MR. LANNING: Never worked for any criminal 21 22 lawyers? JUROR NUMBER 122: No, I did work for a judge 23 at one point. 24 MR. LANNING: Who was that? 25

1	JUROR NUMBER 122: But he wasn't a judge then.
2	
3	MR. LANNING: Thank you. You indicated that
4	your brother had been charged in a homicide that
5	involved a dog handler?
6	JUROR NUMBER 122: Yes, (unintelligible) the
7	dog.
8	MR. LANNING: And can I ask the brother's name?
9	JUROR NUMBER 122: Do I have to tell the whole
10	jury that?
11	MR. LANNING: No, no, no. No, ma'am.
12	JUROR NUMBER 122: He went to school with the
13	judge.
14	MR. LANNING: Political affiliation?
15	JUROR NUMBER 122: Democrat.
16	MR. LANNING: And member of any clubs or
17	organizations?
18	JUROR NUMBER 122: No.
19	MR. LANNING: Member of a church?
20	JUROR NUMBER 122: We attend church but to say
21	a member, no.
	MR. LANNING: In reference to your brother, is
23	that something that you would be okay with discussing
24	in private?
25	JUROR NUMBER 122: Sure, I don't have a problem

discussing it, I don't feel I need to give his name 1 in front of other jurors. 2 MR. LANNING: That's fine. Did that involve 3 the handler named Preston? 4 JUROR NUMBER 122: Yes. 5 MR. LANNING: Was -- how long did your brother 6 7 spend in prison? JUROR NUMBER 122: Twenty years. 8 MR. LANNING: And then the conviction got 9 10 reversed or? JUROR NUMBER 122: It was a hung jury and he 11 plea bargained and I think because he plea bargained 12 they didn't bring his case back up when they were 13 bringing the dog cases back up is how I would 14 15 interpret that. MR. LANNING: Did your brother ever express to 16 you how he had been treated by the system or do you 17 feel he would been treated fairly by the system? 18 JUROR NUMBER 122: Yes, I felt -- yes. 19 MR. LANNING: Did they get the right guy? 20 JUROR NUMBER 122: That I don't know. That I 21 don't know. 22 23 MR. LANNING: To this day? JUROR NUMBER 122: I'M sure I never will know. 24 MR. LANNING: Did your brother take a position? 25

JUROR NUMBER 122: They were actually three 1 defendants so he doesn't discuss it and I don't ask. 2 MR. LANNING: Okay. Juror 116, educational 3 4 background? JUROR NUMBER 116: I've a Bachelor's in general 5 studies from (unintelligible). 6 MR. LANNING: And you indicate that you're 7 retired federal employee, what was your --8 JUROR NUMBER 116: I spent eight and a half 9 years in the Army and twenty-one and a half years 10 with the Department of Agriculture Food and Nutrition 11 12 Service. MR. LANNING: Department of Agriculture what? 13 JUROR NUMBER 116: Food and Nutrition Service. 14 MR. LANNING: What brought you down to Florida? 15 JUROR NUMBER 116: I retired, I drove around 16 the country, my sister and brother-in-law had a condo 17 down here, they said I could use it rent free so I 18 19 came down, still hanging out. MR. LANNING: All right. 20 JUROR NUMBER 116: But now I'm paying rent. 21 MR. LANNING: And ever married? 22 23 JUROR NUMBER 116: No. MR. LANNING: Significant other? 24 JUROR NUMBER 116: No. 25

MR. LANNING: The juror sheet indicates that 1 you or a close family member's been a victim of a 2 crime, is that the same incident that we were talking 3 about earlier? JUROR NUMBER 116: Yes. 5 MR. LANNING: Any other incidents? 6 JUROR NUMBER 116: No. 7 MR. LANNING: Your political affiliation? 8 JUROR NUMBER 116: I'm a registered Republican 9 but I am independent. 10 MR. LANNING: And any clubs or organizations? 11 JUROR NUMBER 116: No. 12 MR. LANNING: Member of a church? 13 JUROR NUMBER 116: No. 14 MR. LANNING: Juror 114. 15 (Thereupon, the proceedings were previously 16 transcribed.) 17 THE COURT: Okay. Unless I hear something 18 else, we'll take a fifteen minute break as well and 19 we'll be back here at 11:00 o'clock. Thank you. 20 (Thereupon, a recess was taken in the 21 22 proceedings.) THE COURT: Okay. We can bring out 23 24 Mr. Bradley. (Thereupon, the defendant was escorted into the 25

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courtroom by the court deputy.)

MR. MOORE: Judge Reinman, we had three venire members who wanted to have a private discussion.

THE COURT: I was going to ask you all that if you want to do that now or when did you want to do that?

MR. MOORE: Probably ought to get them out of the way.

THE COURT: Okay. I was --

MR. LANNING: Judge, I need to make everybody aware of a matter. I was heading down the stairs a juror approached me and said -- asked me, you know, said it's not about this case, could tell me what constitutes a worthless check and I said I can't do that.

THE COURT: Okay.

MR. LANNING: I can tell you which one it was.

MR. BROWN: That's fine.

MR. LANNING: Number 5.

THE COURT: Okay. I did receive a Wuesthoff -a note from Wuesthoff Medical Center which was also a
work release form for Juror Number 42 that he was
seen on Sunday, 3/16, and that he's not to return to
work until 3/19. So, I'll go ahead and release Juror
Number 42. Juror Number 42 will be released for

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cause. If you do want to question jurors individually, we can do that. I do have their numbers, I know who they are. So, I'll go ahead and take care of that. Anything else we need to address?

MR. MOORE: No.

MR. BROWN: No.

THE COURT: Okay. We can bring in Juror Number

(Thereupon, Juror Number 63 was escorted into the courtroom by the court deputy and the proceedings were had as follows:)

THE COURT: Okay. Juror Number 63, in the questioning you were asked about a victim of a crime and you said that you would prefer to respond to that answer outside the presence of the other jurors and that's acceptable. Can you tell us about that at this time?

JUROR NUMBER 63: Yes, my daughter was -disclosed to me the day high school started that she
had been molested for the previous three years by her
uncle. The trial took three years, he ended up
taking a plea and I just didn't think everybody
needed to know that.

THE COURT: That is fine, people -- you know, that type of information we understand. Do you --

how long ago was that?

JUROR NUMBER 63: 1990 -- she graduated in '94.

THE COURT: So, that -- and so -- and when did the uncle go to trial?

JUROR NUMBER 63: He went to trial in '92. It took the whole year, the whole first year of high school. So, it was at (unintelligible). He took a plea deal, he went to prison for two years, got out in the middle of her senior year. He was on probation, absconded and went back to prison in 2000 something, about 2002, and finished out his sentence.

THE COURT: Okay. And where was that?

JUROR NUMBER 63: It happened here in Brevard County.

THE COURT: Okay. Was it prosecuted by the State Attorney's Office?

JUROR NUMBER 63: Yes, ma'am.

THE COURT: Okay. Do you have any concerns about the way that that case was handled?

JUROR NUMBER 63: At the time I did because I thought it was unfair, but as time goes on I realize that it was for her benefit that the plea was struck the way it was and, you know, she was able to continue on with her life. So, any animosity I had is gone, you know, as you grow -- get older and you

go through experiences, you learn that things happen 1 the way they're supposed to happen for the benefit of 2 3 all parties. Okay. Questions by the State? 4 THE COURT: No, Your Honor. MR. BROWN: 5 THE COURT: Questions by the Defense? 6 MR. MOORE: Did you say the case actually went 7 to trial? 8 JUROR NUMBER 63: No, he took a plea right 9 before jury selection. 10 MR. MOORE: Did you have any contact with the 11 12 defendant's defense attorneys? JUROR NUMBER 63: Oh, yes. 13 MR. MOORE: You want to tell me about that. 14 JUROR NUMBER 63: It wasn't pleasant. I was 15 being asked questions that I really didn't know the 16 answers to and the defense attorney was drilling me 17 I'm sure to see if I was trying to hold anything 18 back, which I wasn't, and so it was uncomfortable, it 19 was emotional, obviously it's your child and. 20 MR. MOORE: Sure. I'm guessing she had a 21 similar experience with the defense attorneys 22 (unintelligible) about? 23 24 JUROR NUMBER 63: Oh, yes. MR. MOORE: And so -- any carry over from that, 25

either what your doubter went through and the defense 1 or the uncle, or what you went through with the uncle 2 that would cause us concern up here? 3 JUROR NUMBER 63: Absolutely not, no. Once 4 again, the realization after it was all said and done 5 you realize they're just doing their job. 6 MR. LANNING: So, you see that the uncle had a 7 8 right --JUROR NUMBER 63: Oh, yes. 9 MR. MOORE: -- to have his interest 10 (unintelligible) aggressively (unintelligible)? 11 JUROR NUMBER 63: Yes. 12 MR. MOORE: Represented by the defense 13 14 attorneys. JUROR NUMBER 63: He had a good attorney. 15 MR. MOORE: I don't have anymore questions. 16 THE COURT: Okay. Ma'am, we're going to have 17 you go back outside and when everyone else comes in 18 if you'll come back in. 19 JUROR NUMBER 63: Okay. Thank you. 20 THE COURT: Okay. Thank you. 21 (Thereupon, Juror Number 63 exited the 22 23 courtroom.) THE COURT: Okay. If we could bring in 122. 24 (Thereupon, Juror Number 122 was escorted into 25

1 the courtroom by the court deputy and the proceedings were 2 had as follows:) THE COURT: Okay. Juror Number 122, when 3 Mr. Lanning was discussing with you your brother, you 4 said that you were comfortable talking with --5 talking to us outside the presence of everyone else, 6 7 which is understandable. What is your brother's name? JUROR NUMBER 122: 9 THE COURT: Okay. And how long ago was he 10 released from prison? 11 JUROR NUMBER 122: I was sixteen, I'm fifty 12 now, he was in there twenty years, thirty-six. So, 13 fourteen years. 14 THE COURT: So, he was released fourteen years 15 16 ago? JUROR NUMBER 122: Yes. 17 THE COURT: And I'm assuming because of what 18 you said he went to 19 JUROR NUMBER 122: Yes. 20 THE COURT: And as a result of that situation, 21 do you have -- do you hold any ill will towards the 22 State Attorney's Office. 23 JUROR NUMBER 122: No, I do not. I've worked 24

for a long time as a legal secretary and, you know,

there's both sides of -- there's two sides to every 1 2 story. 3 THE COURT: You said there was two other defendants as well? JUROR NUMBER 122: Yes. 5 THE COURT: Okay. 6 JUROR NUMBER 122: Yes. So, no, I do not have 7 a problem. 8 THE COURT: Any ill will towards the Public 9 Defender's Office? 10 JUROR NUMBER 122: No. 11 THE COURT: Okay. Was he represented by the 12 public defender? 13 JUROR NUMBER 122: No, he was represented by 14 Dan Ciener. 15 THE COURT: Okay. Questions by the State. 16 MR. BROWN: No, Your Honor. 17 THE COURT: Questions by the Defense. 18 MR. MOORE: Do you remember the names of the 19 codefendants? 20 JUROR NUMBER 122: One of them got 21 electrocuted. Yes, one was the last name 22 and the other one was 23 24 MR. MOORE: Well, one of them was executed? JUROR NUMBER 122: He was electrocuted. He I 25

1 guess ended up being an electrician and I read in the paper that he got electrocuted. 2 MR. MOORE: Not by the State? 3 JUROR NUMBER 122: No. No. No, I'm sorry, I 4 should have said. I should have said, sorry. 5 MR. MOORE: Were the other two defendants 6 7 convicted? JUROR NUMBER 122: I think they both served 8 time but not as long as my brother. 9 MR. MOORE: So, he got the worst of it? 10 JUROR NUMBER 122: Yes. Yes. I mean, it ended 11 up being a hung jury and the only thing the jury 12 wanted after hours of deliberation was they wanted to 13 talk to the dog handler and my dad at that time 14 didn't have money to have the case retired so he plea 15 bargained. 16 Thank you. All right. 17 MR. MOORE: Okay. Thank you. You can go THE COURT: 18 outside and come back in with the rest of the jurors. 19 (Thereupon, Juror Number 122 exited the 20 21 courtroom.) THE COURT: Okay. We can bring in Number 126. 22 (Thereupon, Juror Number 126 was escorted into 23 the courtroom by the court deputy and the proceedings were 24 25 had as follows:)

THE COURT: Okay. Juror Number 126, you were talking to us this morning about the relationship with the defendant's grandmother So, could you tell me that again? With all due respect, I could barely hear and you kind of caught me off guard and I didn't know who you were talking about so I wasn't able to put it together. So, can you tell me that again.

JUROR NUMBER 126: Well, this past weekend my church had the pastor's and first lady's anniversary and we had a banquet and I was sitting at a table with about fifteen, twenty other individuals in my church and two or three of the ladies happened to say I wonder how his grandmother, and they mentioned her name, you want me to mention her name?

THE COURT: You can say her name.

JUROR NUMBER 126: Denise, I wonder how Denise is taking it with her grandson, didn't really have to do with this trial.

THE COURT: And was Denise with you? Were they talking to Denise?

JUROR NUMBER 126: No.

THE COURT: Or just talking about it.

JUROR NUMBER 126: They were just talking about it and someone said I can't even imagine that and

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day at church I noticed that she was -- Denise was in choir, she's in two or three choirs, and then she and the only thing and has done work at my house between, you know, plumbing and electrical work and sometimes when I'm out there struggling trying to cut grass and he'll stop in and cut it himself and edge and do all kinds of things.

So, that's it.

THE COURT: Okay. So -- and that is the -- Denise is the defendant's grandmother?

JUROR NUMBER 126: Yes.

THE COURT: Okay. How did you find out that, just from when they were talking?

JUROR NUMBER 126: Right, when they was talking.

THE COURT: Did they say Mr. Bradley's name?

JUROR NUMBER 126: Yeah, they said -- no, they

were saying that they can't imagine how she can -
when they said Denise, then they said that how can

she -- I wonder how she -- I think I heard her say I

wonder how she's taking it with her grandson getting

ready to have this jury trial for murder. And then I

asked my wife, I said is Denise the grandmother --

when I got home I asked my wife, she said I guess that's Denise's grandmother. I mean, that's the guy's, you know, grandmother. (Unintelligible) same names.

THE COURT: Okay. And how does that make you feel about being a juror in this case?

JUROR NUMBER 126: I don't know now. I thought about it all weekend and just kind of weird really. She goes to my church and is in choir, two or three choirs, and they use to be really close really, I just feel kind of leery about it now.

THE COURT: Well, you know that this case involves Mr. Bradley being charged with first degree murder, you know from prior discussions that if there's a conviction of Count I then there's going to be the second phase, the penalty phase, and as a juror you would participate in making a recommendation to the Court of either death, you know, or life in prison without the possibility of parole. We discussed that so you know that. So, you can -- only you can tell us whether this is an appropriate case for you to be on or this is not an appropriate case for you to be on.

JUROR NUMBER 126: I think it probably wouldn't 1 be an appropriate case. I mean, I'm leery about, you 2 3 know, voting for death for him now that I know his grandmother and family goes to my church 4 (unintelligible) to church. 5 THE COURT: Okay. Questions by the State. 6 MR. BROWN: You want to stipulate? 7 MR. MOORE: Can we have a minute? 8 THE COURT: Yes, you may. 9 (Thereupon, a pause was taken in the 10 11 proceedings.) MR. MOORE: We'll stipulate. 12 MR. BROWN: Agreed. 13 THE COURT: Okay. Juror Number 126, I'm going 14 to go ahead and release you from being considered as 15 16 a potential juror in this case. I know prosecutors who do that in the majority of as

it was a bad thing and I think we're going to be

running into that, then we do that motion, so.

That's not the situation. There's nothing -- there's

no rule, there's no case, there's no law that says we

can't do that.

MR. MCMASTER: I'm not suggesting that they can't do it, I'm just saying my experience has been normal that the Defense does not want that referred to in open court, or the State's precluded from referring to them as public defenders and I just want to make sure if it's in fact a strategic decision of the Defense that defendant are in agreement.

MR. MOORE: Just like discussing the right to remain silent, sometimes it's appropriate and sometimes it isn't. Sometimes we bring it up,

sometimes we don't. We're not going to explain why we do things if we don't have -- if it's a matter of a constitutional right the defendant has to remain silent, to testify or not testify, then certainly the Court can ask about that, you know, or, you know, something that involves a waiver of a constitutional right, but there's nothing wrong with what we did.

THE COURT: Okay. I'm not going to do that but I do at the close of the Defense -- the State or -- and if the Defense puts on a case I do ask the defendant if he -- if he's satisfied with the representation of his attorneys and I do intend to ask him that at that time. Okay. Mr. McMaster.

MR. MCMASTER: Judge, the other thing is just for planning purposes. I advised you we had four witnesses for the proffer this morning. One of the witnesses, Amanda Ozburn, had a C Section three hours ago, delivered a child, she's going to be in the hospital until Thursday or Friday. JUROR NUMBER 105: That's pretty -- I mean, I'm good if you guys. I mean, if you're going to pick me, pick me, don't have any second thought about it, you know, I'm just throwing it out there. Don't need to do me any favors. Not worried about it.

MR. LANNING: Okay.

THE COURT: If you were to be a juror and then that article were to come up and if the press were to match you up, me as court administration would have a And with all due respect, with our contract kind of with the media, I don't believe they'd do anything with that. They understand what -- how serious our concerns about your privacy. They -- at least, you know, with all due respect, the local press we have a good relationship with. We've had

lots of dealings with them, they've had lots of dealings with us. I told you before we have a media -- a person at the courthouse that that's their job to deal with the press, she's been involved in this. She's been in and out of the courtroom. She's talked with them. I don't think even if they matched it up they'd do anything with it.

JUROR NUMBER 105: Okay.

THE COURT: Now, to tell you the truth, if there's -- if national press becomes an issue, we'd have to discuss it with them. I'm not aware of national press becoming an issue at this time, it could become an issue but I don't think that will be an issue.

JUROR NUMBER 105: No, I'm just --

THE COURT: If it did happen we would definitely be involved in that.

JUROR NUMBER 105: It was just there.

THE COURT: That's something that we would be concerned about, court administration, I would be concerned about it, I would bring it to the attention of court administration and we would address it. I mean, I can't -- you know, you never can anticipate everything and you never can address everything but we make -- I mean, that's part of what we do. So, we

We'll have the hearings tomorrow from 8:30 to 10:00. Now, I'm assuming you want to address you motion in limine, the one that Mr. Pirolo filed, that's in conjunction with the proffer, is that correct?

MR. PIROLO: Yes, Judge, it's just adding a couple more statements to (unintelligible).

THE COURT: Okay. So, we'll address -- I assume -- I haven't had a chance to read it in detail but I assume it's in conjunction. I am going to read it tonight. So, we'll address that as well. We'll do that from 8:30 to 10:00. At 10:00 or as soon as we get done with this we'll start the jury selection process and then we will -- the jury will be here and as soon as we're ready for them, we'll bring them up.

Any questions or concerns?

MR. MOORE: I just need to have Mr. Bradley kept here long enough so I can pick out some more clothes for him.

THE COURT: Okay. They can do that as well. Okay. Court will be in recess until 8:30 tomorrow morning. Thank you.

(Thereupon, the proceedings were concluded.)
