been -- has already been extended. The Supreme Court in their second order provided that no further extensions of time should be necessary.

Can we verify that the transcripts have been filed with the Trial Court Clerk?

MS. BARDING: Transcripts per the designation to the court reporter have been filed with the Clerk's office.

THE COURT: Okay. Were all -- I think it also provided that exhibits should be attached or exhibits should be available.

Are the exhibits with it?

MS. BARDING: Yes.

THE COURT: Okay. Can the State -- ma'am, the Assistant Attorney General, did you have something you wanted to say?

MS. KIRCHER: Yes, Your Honor, I'm sorry.

There was a motion to supplement the records with the entire transcript, specifically the portions of the voir dire that were -- that were cut out of the record on appeal. And the Florida Supreme Court did sign and issue that order yesterday, the motion to supplement. So in that order yesterday, it provides that the excerpt as a part of the record on appeal be provided no later than October 17th of

this year. So that's -- that's the most updated information.

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THE COURT: Okay. You say -- I have that order in front of me. You say October 17th, I think it's October 7th.

MS. KIRCHER: Okay, I'm sorry. The information that I received was October 17th. So if you've got the order in front of you, Judge, then that's the appropriate time.

The order, I do have it in THE COURT: Yeah. front of me, and it's in bold and underlined. it says October -- it says October the 7th. So I think we're -- okay, we'll follow up on that as well as -- we'll keep that -- we'll follow up on that. It says 20 -- the Supreme Court also required that 20 days after the filing of the transcript, the Trial Clerk Court shall file the record on appeal with this Court. It should include all items required by Rule 9.200 and by any order issued by the Supreme Court. It gave specifics as to the master index, shall be in a Volume One with the individual index for the remaining values -- volumes, and that the trial clerk shall provide all exhibits to counsel.

Has this been done as well? Are we still --

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I don't know if the deadline has been passed on that.

> MS. BARDING: Yes. This has been done.

THE COURT: Okay. Is there anything else that we need to address that would be appropriate to address at this status conference?

MR. MCMASTER: Nothing from the State.

MR. PIROLO: Judge, I'm assuming that since the Attorney General's Office has requested the additional transcriptions they are covering the cost of it? We had requested the entire trial from opening statement through closing to be transcribed, and there were portions of the voir dire that we deemed necessary to be transcribed. And I believe those have been transcribed.

We didn't feel that the other, you know, two or three weeks worth of jury selection was needed, and we didn't feel -- waste taxpayer money to do that, so that's why we did not transcribe the entire voir dire proceedings. So, again, I'm assuming since the Attorney General's Office has requested the additional transcriptions, they are covering the costs.

THE COURT: Okay. Ms. Kircher, can you

1 address that?

MS. KIRCHER: Yes, Your Honor. And I do apologize, I was able to make out portions of that, but it was kind of fading in and out as to volume. But the rule required in the original order by the Florida Supreme Court was that the entire transcript be provided in record on appeal. There is no order or distinction for doing excerpts of the trial.

It was our position, and then speaking with appellate counsel from the public defender's office, that he had been in communication with the public defender's office and had, basically, let them know that he needed the entire transcript to make sure that he was covering all of the possible appellate issues for future habeas proceedings as well. And that was not able to be accomplished yet, so that's why we did the motion to supplement.

But our position would be that the transcripts and the record on appeal is the responsibility of the public defender's office due to the original order of the Florida Supreme Court and through the designation to the Clerk. There's no rule that allows for, you know, partitioning or doing excerpts, as the record on appeal has to be

the whole thing.

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Okay. Mr. Pirolo?

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THE COURT:

MR. PIROLO: Judge, I know under the case law that we are to provide. Our obligation is to designate those portions that we deem -- that would be sufficient to demonstrate a possible reversible error on appeal and those portions that are necessary. And we are under an obligation not to waste any money from, you know, public funds to transcribe materials that we do not believe demonstrate reversible error.

And I believe we've done that, we were very specific during the voir dire proceedings which days to have transcribed. I believe there's two or three days of the actual voir dire proceedings that we asked to have transcribed. And, obviously, we had the entire trial, you know, transcribed from opening through closing argument.

THE COURT: I'm just reviewing the Supreme Court's order. Okay, what it appeared to me that the -- it says "the complete record." would appear to me that the record is not complete without the entire transcript, so I'm going to -- I mean, we already entered -- the Supreme Court already entered an order requiring the additional

transcripts of the proceedings that were not provided previously to be provided, so I'm going to require that the public defender pay that portion.

Mr. Pirolo, if you want to brief that issue and provide me with case law, otherwise, I'll reconsider it if that's appropriate.

MR. PIROLO: Okay.

THE COURT: Okay.

MR. PIROLO: Thank you.

THE COURT: I see a hand in the back. I don't know who that person is, so I don't usually take hands from the audience. So if there's someone you want to talk to. I think I've got all representatives here.

MS. BARDING: The court reporters.

THE COURT: Oh, that's the court reporter?

Okay, that would be someone appropriate for the proceedings. Actually, I should have had you sit up here.

Yes, ma'am?

MS. GOIN: Your Honor, I'm Carol Goin. I'm the owner of Ryan Reporting. I'm actually not a court reporter, but I own the firm that has transcribed everything.

THE COURT: Yes, ma'am.

MR. PIROLO: We transcribed based on the designation we received from the public defender.

THE COURT: Okay.

MS. GOIN: And we received the order yesterday from the Supreme Court, the supplement to the record. We will begin immediately transcribing that.

THE COURT: Okay.

MR. PIROLO: It will be virtually impossible for us to meet the October 7th deadline.

THE COURT: Okay.

MR. PIROLO: We transcribed 15 -- the 15 jurors that were selected, and there were over 200 jurors interviewed. So we have 11 days worth of jury selection less 15 jurors that we need transcribed. We'll do our best. We'll begin immediately, but I'm not sure we can meet the October 7th deadline.

THE COURT: Okay. Ms. Kircher, any response to that? Can --

MS. KIRCHER: No response, Your Honor. She did -- I'm not sure if it was this particular Madame Court Reporter or representative, but the reporting agency did reach out to me yesterday. And we spoke about this issue and clarified that,

so I was aware that there was still substantial jury selection left to transcribe. So the order gives the date and we can just -- you know, they can do it as fast as they can do it, but that's about as fast as they can go.

THE COURT: Okay. Can you give me a date that you think it could be provided?

MS. GOIN: Based on my best guesstimate, I believe we can be complete by the end of October. And as soon as we are complete, we will turn them in. We'll send it to Kim Barding as soon as it's finished, and I'll give updates to Kim Barding's office as to where we stand. And we're still waiting for some additional digitals. Not the jury selection, but additional hearings. We should get those from court admin in the next day or two. I requested them yesterday evening.

THE COURT: I'm concerned that the end of October might not be acceptable.

Ms. Kircher, perhaps you could advise the Court what will happen if the deadline is not met.

MS. KIRCHER: Well, Your Honor -- and it's different in every case -- but we have reached out to the Florida Supreme Court Clerk and spoken with her about this issue yesterday. And if it becomes

necessary to do a motion to extend based on extenuating circumstances with the court reporter actually producing the documents, that has been done before. There's usually, you know, a little bit of flexibility with time based on that, but we can always do a motion to accept the court reporter's designation on time. They do take that into account. But in this particular case, I couldn't advise without getting that from the Clerk.

THE COURT: Okay. I can tell you that the jury selection, I mean, it was extensive and voluminous. I mean, I think it lasted two weeks, so that -- that's -- it was a major part of the proceeding, probably about a third of the entire proceeding. So it's -- I mean --

MS. KIRCHER: Yes, Your Honor.

THE COURT: I understand if she has difficulty not meeting the October 7th deadline.

MS. KIRCHER: Yes, Your Honor. And I have read the portions of the voir dire that were transcribed and notated each excerpt from that, so I know that that's still an extensive amount of transcription to be done.

THE COURT: Okay. Perhaps, based on that, it

MR. PIROLO: That's a Sunday.
